Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment Celebration!

As we head towards the end of Term 1, we are thrilled to see tremendous growth coming from our Springside students in the reading space. Showing what a difference learning structured routines and engagement norms at school can make, our students have benefitted from the consistency of evidence-informed reading instruction that has taken place for the last year across the school.



Achievement (Reading) - Influence

High or very high performance, maintained consistently over three years or is on a positive improvement trajectory, for the measures of: top two bands, (reducing) bottom two bands and learning gain.

As aligned with our Strategic Plan, our school-wide focus last year was focused on embedding evidence-based reading and spelling programs across our school curriculum. With all our teaching staff engaged in professional learning and coaching to adjust their practice earlier last year, we are thrilled to share noticeable shifts in our school achievement data. It is important to note this work began in Prep in 2020, and just look at where our school performance is sitting: 'INFLUENCE'.

Below is some of our data from last year that reaffirms our relentless focus on this work. In 2023, all students in grades 3-6 received evidence-informed instruction at a whole-class level through Spelling Mastery lessons. However, check out the growth when students also received targeted group work and/or Learning Intervention (TLI)! As a result, our school has invested in two additional full time tutors to run Masterclasses (Learning Enhancement) in 2023.

The Data

- Some of the students who have been flagged in 2022 and 2023 as needing phonics instruction.
- Data is de-identified. Students were in grades 3-5 last year.
- Students either received no specific phonics instruction (other than Spelling Mastery), had support in the classroom OR a TLI cycle or they received BOTH support in the classroom AND in a TLI cycle.
- · Growth key:
- · Moved 1 stage or less in a year
- Moved 2 stages in a year
- · Moved 3-4 stages in a year
- Moved 5 or more stages in a year
- Orange students have a diagnosis that can impact their literacy acquisition (ID or dyslexia).

Same day notification of absence.

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. **Compass:** log the absence directly using the Compass app.
- 2. **Telephone 9449-6400:** the school office and let the staff know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
- 3. **Email:** the school and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent, and you need to know if your child isn't at school. Since the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained. This system also promotes daily school attendance.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day. Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.

RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS

What is Respectful Relationships?

Respectful Relationships is about tackling family violence through education.

Rosie Batty, CEO of the Luke Batty Foundation "the school community is an essential part of social reform by modelling a culture of respect through the whole school, not just by teaching respect in the classroom".

In 2017, Respectful Relationships education began to be taught as part of the Victorian curriculum. The Victorian Government is supporting schools to model respectful relationships across the whole school community as part of its commitment to respectful relationships education. The Government is providing Victorian schools with a range of extra supports and resources, including new Respectful Relationships teaching and learning materials. In the classroom, children will learn problem-solving skills, to develop empathy, support their own wellbeing and build healthy relationships with others. The initiative will also provide resources to best support children and staff who are affected by family violence.

When children build positive relationships with their teachers and peers, they feel safer and happier at school, are more resilient and have positive social attitudes. Positive relationships also increase a child's sense of social connectedness and belonging which can result in better health and academic outcomes.



There are different punctuation marks that could be used as an ending point for a sentence. There are question marks for questions, exclamation marks for exclamation sentences or commands, and full stops for statements or commands. A comma may be included as a punctuation mark for compound sentences. This is what we've been learning about in 5B thank you for your time.

On Monday 27th of Feb, 13 Springsiders attended District Swimming at Melton Waves. These students showed our school values and participated in all events with a smile on their faces.


